Relaunch Event

Pond Management and problem solving



After an absence of ~400 years, beavers are now back in Somerset. SWT has been commissioned to produce a Beaver Management Strategy for the county, and after significant research a draft Strategy has been produced.

We now need input and feedback on

An update from Valerie and John Godsmark

I was very sorry that John and I were unable to attend the Re-launch event at Easton Village Hall on saturday 6th July due to a clash of two other commitments.

News from Park Wood

This year in the woodland seems very different to last and we're not sure if it's because of changes in weather. Last year was the first we'd had a bounty of Blackberries so enjoyed a good amount of jam. It was also a year when we were very concerned by what we termed a "Plague" of Alder-leaf larvae in July to be followed by the beetles in August and September through to early this year. We were concerned that the Alder trees and others which were being attacked would defoliate, be unable to photosynthesise and die.



This year Brambles flowered early and didn't attract the bees and butterflies we would hope for. It's been a poor year for both taxa and our target species Silver-washed Fritillary has not been seen this year. That's a concern. The good news is that we didn't find a resurgence of the Alder-leaf beetle and the Alder trees seem to be doing well. It's a year when Nettles and other rank vegetation are thriving so some control is needed to encourage the diverse ground-flora of an Ancient woodland. Not an easy task.

Reserve spotlight

Lyde Green, Norton St Philip

Our woodland and meadow reserve is on the edge of Norton St Philip and we incite you to visit and enjoy what we have achieved... and to share ideas and experience with us.

There are public footpaths with far reaching views across the upper half of the field, while access to the paths and glades in the woodland area can be arranged by contacting us.

We have transformed the four acre pasture into a thriving woodland by planting over five hundred broadleaf whips in 2014 and new or supplanted hedgerows in subsequent years. We are reinstating an ancient pond, creating a wetland area and leaning by trial and error how to promote biodiversity and wildlife. The pictures below show our reserve in 2014 (left) and 2024 (right).

We have planted stan alone oak, holly and beech trees and gorse in the upper pasture, which is occasionally grazed by sheep or horses and cut or baled for hay every summer.
